

RescueTime helps you understand your daily habits so you can focus and be more productive.




As the name says, this app is designed to rescue your time. RescueTime calculates how much time you spend on the internet, with detailed logs on how much time you are spending doing what. It aims at maximizing your productivity by monitoring your internet use, and telling you when you're being productive or are distracted. It has a free variant which should suffice for most, with the Premium version allowing you to block websites you think are distracting you, and more. You can take a free 14-day trial of RescueTime Premium before choosing to pay. RescueTime is available for Mac, PC, Linux and Android. This app is somewhat invasive, but helpful if you have a really bad time concentrating!



This app is only available on iOS for now, but it is easily one of the best. It is similar to Evernote in its functionality, but is for people who prefer to write and draw things, rather than type. InkFlow will transform your device into a drawing tablet, allowing you to use it like paper, and export your notes so that you can easily share them. This one is for the visual thinkers. It is available for free, with a premium variant called InkFlow Plus, which comes with extra bells and whistles. The only downside is that there isn't a word on an Android app yet, sadly.

Set in Assagao, Goa under the expansive shady branch of a three-hundred-yearold tree is this unique Asian kitchen, The Banyan and thus so aptly named. The original old Goan house that existed here has been given a facelift and the surrounding gardens brought back to life.

As you step in through the grand intricately carved wooden doors of The Banyan you notice a wonderful amalgamation of Indonesian and Thai design with a hint of Goan architecture. The eclectic yet uniquely harmonised collaboration of styles was the idea of local architect Christopher Gonsalves. The house itself is painted in hues of grey and white with wooden accents. The rattan furniture, true to its Balinese form has been lifted with colourful cushions, low tables and sofas to create a relaxed and casual dining atmosphere. But it is at night that this place truly comes to life with its subtle lighting and a Buddha right in the center of the restaurant. There is a small but quaint waterfall in a corner next to the private dining area for groups, and if you are willing, then do go and look for the resident terrapin named - Oogway (Like the

Kung Fu Panda). The bar area is perfect for those gathering with friends for drinks and snacks with its high tables, but the pièce de résistance must be the back wall with a collage of wooden carved chests with hidden writing on them, if you can find it. The owner Tejpal Singh Gandhi's handcarried unique wrought iron lanterns and other knick-knacks from Bali help complete the look of this restaurant.

Tejpal, a third-generation restaurateur with more than forty years of experience, is the brainchild behind The Banyan. He is very well known in Pune for his authentic north Indian cuisine restaurant 'The

Great Punjab' which opened in Koregaon Park thirteen years ago, with the recent addition of their Baner branch eight years ago. Tejpal tells us, "I always wanted to have a restaurant in Goa as I have such fond memories of going to school and growing up in this amazing state, it is an integral part of who I am." Having eaten in all the best restaurants in the UK and travelled extensively in the east, the seed of The Banyan was planted, and just like the branches of the Banyan, the menu grew and covered all the flavours of Asia.

Like the venue itself, the menu at The Banyan covers an array of dishes from various parts of Asia and was thoughtfully compiled by consulting chefs Ajit and Victor. From their small plates comprising of items such as Stir Fried Lotus Stems, Tofu Tangsuyuk from Korea, Krispy Konjee Lamb, a favorite among the locals, to one of their signature dishes Son in Law Eggs. However, what is not to be missed is the vast array of Dim Sum on the menu, with different types of skins made in-house and with their own dipping sauces. All the sauces are made fresh using ingredients from The Banyan's kitchen garden all mounted on a wall. There is something for everyone here from Spring Vegetables with Garlic & Coriander, Zucchini, Leek & Shitake Mushroom to Prawn & Cilantro Har Gow or the other Prawn



and Chicken Sui Mai, from Chicken and Water Chestnut to Spicy Black Bean Beef Dumplings but to name a few.

One must try The 'Baos' –a type of steamed, filled bun, you can choose to have it stuffed or open and there are so many variations as to the fillings and the preparations. To name but a few, another signature of the restaurant is the Roast Duck Baos or Adobo (Pork Adobo topped with Lettuce) or Garlic Beef (Beef Tenders sautéed with burnt garlic & coriander topped with mint Mayo). In the stuffed variety of this, The Banyan has introduced some local flavours with the Goan Sausage or you can just go for the Pulled Pork if this is your meat of choice.

In the large plates there is a lot to choose from, such as the famous Tempura with a choice of vegetables, Prawn or Chicken, Cha Gio (Vietamese Spring Rolls), Char Siu Spare Ribs – done in a Cantonese style to Beef Negimaki (Rolled Sliced Beef with Scallions in Teriyaki sauce). If this doesn't fill you up, one can move on to the Soups. The 'Slow Boat to Thailand' is the unique signature dish here – It is a steaming pot of aromatic spice laced broth served with exotic vegetables, meat or seafood and dumplings. The idea behind this is to be your own chef, you simply dip, cook and eat or sip it the way you want. The Banyan is the very first restaurant to introduce this to Goa.

Another new introduction to Goa is the bowls - a meal in one. One can order from Thai Firsher's Noodles, Chili Ramen with choice of veg or non-veg to The Banyan's own version of the Burmese Khowsuey served very differently. No Asian restaurant would be complete without a choice of curries; Jungle Curry, Sambal Seafood or Chicken, but the Beef Rendang is a must try signature dish here if you are looking for something different from the regular Massaman or Thai curries. Moving on to the main plates you are again greeted with a large choice from all around Asia. Pal Sam Tot (Steamed Fish topped with stir fried mushroom, zucchini, chili peppers in a tamarind sauce) or something as simple but flavourful as Stir Fried Chinese Green.

Last but not the least, there are the desserts, traditional desserts done with a twist such as Khao Tom Mad (sticky rice cooked in coconut milk wrapped in Banana leaf and steamed) or Thap Thim Krop (Water Chestnuts rubies served in chilled coconut milk) or their signature Sweet Dim Sums with an assortment of fillings. But the best thing to beat the heat in Goa is their uniquely flavoured Gelatos, which would be just the perfect thing to finish off your meal.

TEARS IN EYES AND DUST IN LUNGS, FOR PEOPLE LIVING IN THE MINING BELT

The issue of pollution caused by the trucks that carry iron ore from the mining leases to the jetties is as old as the mining industry itself. The rising demand from China in the run up to the Olympics fuelled the state's iron ore demand. That is why the people living in the mining belt have borne the increasing pollution since 2005.

Certain villages in Sattari, Sanguem, Bicholim and Quepem talukas are so showered by this pollution that life with mining dust has become the order of the day. It was in 2012 that the people began to openly speak about their lives in the mining belt. It was the time when authorities began talking about illegal mining.

Pure air is the birth right of every citizen, but it is a privilege denied to the people residing in the mining areas. Villages like Pale, Velguem, Sonshi, Surla have virtually turned into mining dumps. There is no farming happening there, except for a few traditional 'kullaghars' which too are struggling to cope with the pollution.

Those people who were earlier slogging in their farms have now turned into mining dependents. The Gawda community people who made the hills and plains as their homes and cultivated paddy are no more getting their hands soiled in the fields. Their hands are now covered with mining dust.

Owning a truck or driving it is not a big deal for those who have lost their land to the mining firms. This is how they have made quick money. While some have scaled greater heights in the economical hierarchy, there are some still struggling.

All these bare facts about the mining industry were never discussed by the media until 2012 when the M B Shah Commission compelled Goa to discuss about illegal mining



and pollution.

It was only then that we realized there are two kind of people, one mining dependents and another mining affected. The mining leases were really turned into personal properties where no one could even peep into. Several journalists had to face the wrath of security guards when they tried to click pictures. Cases of trespassing were filed against them.

The mine owners remained out of bound of the locals. The big business houses had sub-leased their iron ore extraction to others. That is where the illegal mining bred. But that is not what we are going to discuss now. That has been spoken about post-2012 when people realized that it is their right to know how much extraction was being done by the mining firms.

Environment protection is never on the mind of the mining firms. You cannot have mining and environment go hand in hand. Dust has to fly where there is drilling into the Earth to tap iron ore. But how much pollution can be allowed?

There is no parameter. The locals in the mining belt tell of how officials of Goa State Pollution Control Board (GSPCB) indulge in mere eye washing in the name of measuring the purity of air or water.

You actually don't require any machine to measure the pollution here. They can very well make one of their officers wear a white shirt and stand on any of the roads where iron ore is carried. His shirt will turn maroon in no time and he will gasp for breath. This is what pollution actually means.

No amount of data analysed in the laboratories of GSPCB will save the people from facing the actual pollution. Look at the roof tiles of the houses in these area, they have a tale to tell. Once upon a time, they had their original colour.

When we talk of scientific and environment friendly mining, there must be some method to control pollution. I am sure there are methods, but they must be expensive and hence cutting into the profits of the mining firms. They would naturally not spend on saving lives which are dying a slow death.

There are no studies conducted on how many people in this mining belt suffer from lung diseases. Even if there are studies, they are buried deep in the files of the Government. There is no action taken on them.

Several villagers here are living a life of slavery. They have no voice. If they stop the transport machinery, they are sent behind bars. Asking for clean air is an offence in our democratic state.

The mining firm officials who are sitting in their air-conditioned head offices in Panaji don't miss a single meeting if called by the Chief Minister. But when it comes to directly interacting with villagers, only low level officials are sent. Then the press notes are issued to convince the world how they (mining firms) are environment friendly and people friendly.

Let's forget for the time being about the illegal mining and how crores of rupees were looted by the mining firms. We need to talk about the pollution in this belt.

The real Goenkarponn would be to give a patient hearing to these Goenkars. We know that they have been demanding employment in the mining firms. But don't mix their concerns of pollution with their demand of employment. Several times we see politicians and mining firms doing this.

Let's visit these villages where wells have dried up long back as the mining pits have gone much below the water level. The villagers are dependent on the water that is provided to them through water tankermounted trucks. These tanks are corroded. The water is then shifted to barrels which are lined up along the road, amidst the dust. The polluted water is then taken to every house and drunk.

Such is the pathetic situation. The main roads which are constructed by spending money from our taxes are being used to transport iron ore. Thousands of trucks ply on these roads, leaving no space for the tax payer to ride his two-wheeler. He has to constantly dodge the gigantic wheels of the trucks which can crush him any time. When the State government speaks of a mining corridor, the idea is always pushed into the files, with no follow up.

When we talk about our beautiful Goa with beaches, let's also talk about this part of Goa which is breathing dust every passing hour. While people are suffering, those few who make money are either in their airconditioned homes or have already shifted their base out of Goa.

LESSONS NOT LEARNT FROM SONSHI EPISODE, WILL MAKE US PAY IN THE FUTURE


A decade-long protest against the iron ore mining dust pollution is once again making headlines at local as well as national levels. Sonshi village, tucked between Digne and Honda villages in Sattari taluka is currently in the news, with villagers there holding a strong protest against the pollution due to the non-stop movement of trucks loaded with ore in their area.

It's just been a year since mining recommenced in Sonshi, with as many as six ore leases being operational in and around the village. But the protests by villagers against the increasing dust pollution, water pollution and unemployment and their subsequent arrest is a talking point in every miningrich village.

After a ban that lasted over three years, the iron ore mining industry has resumed in the State, but the struggle of people against the pollution never ends.

On April 11, the villagers from Sonshi, from an economically backward community, took to the road to protest against pollution due to transportation of ore by the trucks ferrying through their residential area. The villagers had formed a human chain and stopped the movement of trucks demanding an end to plying of mining trucks through their village road, cleaner air, water, and basic healthcare.

Villagers obstructed trucks and 45 of them – 23 women – were later arrested. Their struggle came to light when these



villagers refused to bail themselves out even as the mining firms like Sesa Goa and even later Chief Minister Manohar Parrikar assured surety bail bond of Rs 10,000 per person. After spending almost over 10 days in jail, the villagers were released with the intervention of Minister Vishwajit Rane, son of their local MLA Pratapsingh Rane.

"Mining companies can very well avoid taking the Sonshi road which passes through the village and go from the other side for ferrying iron ore. But they don't do it as it saves them a travel of six kilometers," explained Suraj Gawade, a local youth.

"All the pollution norms are thrown to the wind. No one is bothered. Only when there is inspection, you will see

the roads being cleaned up. We inhale dust here and our children fall sick but still the authorities are not bothered," he charged.

Mining in Goa has been associated with illegalities, environmental pollution and a threat to the health of local communities – something that the Supreme Court raised serious concerns about while hearing the illegal mining case – that resulted in the one and half year long ban on the activities.

In Sonshi, mining has destroyed local water bodies and dried up rivulets. The villagers struggle here for getting clean potable water.

"The mining companies were supposed to give us water every day. The tanks do come, but not every day. They pour the water in the tanks kept by the roads and leave. In half an hour, the mining dust settles on them. How can we consume such water? But having no option we go for it," says Sandesh Gawade, an unemployed youth who alleges the miners do not even give them jobs, taking outsiders on labour contracts.

The village that has quite a good population of small school going kids is worried about their health as the increasing pollution is taking a toll on them. "Every alternate day, you will find kids falling sick. There is no fresh air in the atmosphere that these small kids can inhale. Hence, they fall sick. This affects their school attendance

badly," a teacher from the local primary school explains.

While this village was traditionally into farming activity, there are some families who tried to eke out living by finding jobs in the mining firms that sprang up suddenly as the soil was found to be iron ore rich. The mining in the village has commenced six to eight months back, after the long ban period.

"Show me one person who has permanent employment in the mining firms. The youth from our village are either doing some odd jobs or have to travel to work. Even our trucks are lying idle," said Pratap Gawade, who owns a truck.

The village has a lone primary school, with three classrooms, with the student's strength being reduced from forty to six, with two students in each class. With the mining dust and noise, parents of children of adjoining villages have now put their children in other private schools.

This isn't the first protest by Sonshi's residents. In February 2016, they had appealed to the mining companies demanding the same things they are asking for now: continuous supply of drinking water, employment, diversion of trucks from the village area – but failed to get any result. A month later, in March, over 100 villagers were taken into preventive custody as they prepared to block trucks carrying iron ore for e-auctioning. This year again, on January 27, villagers tried to block the trucks again.

With mining industry expected to resume in full swing, with increase in the annual fresh production cap from 20 million tons to 30 million tons, the protest from various villagers is likely to prove a major hurdle for these companies.

INCREASING INCIDENTS OF KING COBRA ENTRY INTO AREAS OF HUMAN SETTLEMENT

> The king cobra or Hamadryad is unique among Indian snakes for an unenviable reputation for aggressiveness and courage. Its staple diet is other smaller snakes and it occasionally eats monitor lizards too.

> "It occurs mainly in the dense forests of the Western Ghats, but today increasing monoculture afforestation and encroachment on the evergreen patches of forests for the cashew plantation have threatened its natural habitat," says Chandrakant Shinde, a wildlifer.

f late, incidents of King Cobras entering into areas of human settlement are continuously on the rise, mainly in the forested areas of Sattari, in the vicinity of the Mhadei Wildlife Sanctuary. Over the last five years, these large snakes have been entering the cashew plantations and also into the adjacent hamlets.

The changing climate, depletion of water resources and degradation of evergreen patches of forests are forcing the king cobra, the largest venomous snake in the world, into human inhabited areas in Sattari. Large areas of the forest have been transformed into plantations of cashew and other horticultural crops.

Just within the period of 24 hours from April 4 and 5, the volunteers of

Animal Rescue Squad caught two king cobras in Thane-Dongurli and one in Brahma-Karmali villages of Sattari. Both these villages lie close to the Mhadei Wildlife Sanctuary. The three volunteers of ARS, Pradeep Gawandalkar, Vinod Sawant and Sunil Sawant rescued and released these snakes.

In Brahma-Karmali, a king cobra of 9.5 feet length had entered the house of Sunil Sawant. The snake caught inside the cashew plantation near Sateri temple of Pali-Thane was 12 feet in length. And a 11 ft-long king cobra was caught near the pump-house of Balasaheb Desai in Thane-Dongurli.

Amrut Singh, the president of ARS said, "On earlier occasions I had caught and rescued three king cobras in Hivre-Khurd of Sattari two years ago. However this time three king cobras have been



DOCTORS ARE NOT MAGICIANS, WE TOO ARE HUMAN BEINGS: DR MEDHA SALKAR

After the shocking incident of a private doctor being assaulted by a woman, the Indian Medical Association has taken up the issue before the authorities. TNV spoke to IMA Goa branch chief Dr. Medha Salkar.



The recent assault on a senior doctor in Carmona has sent shock waves through the medical fraternity in Goa. What impact will this have on the doctor-patient relation?

Assaults on doctors has given a sense of defensiveness to the doctors. If we have to treat a patient there are certain risks that we have to take for the wellbeing of the patient. I have to really do it the way I want, but under the present situation I have to think ten times before I take any step.

Will there be any law implemented?

The question is how the implementation of any law will help. After being assaulted, a doctor will have already lost his dignity, and short term punishment to the accused will not change anything. In my letter written to the CM I have clearly mentioned that the society is the sufferer in the long term if suitable action is not taken.

What action has IMA taken so far? We have already met the CM and explained him about the situation.

Is provision of some kind of security system or police protection considered an option to avoid such incidents?

Permanent police protection is unfortunately neither possible nor feasible. There was also a discussion on installation of CCTV cameras, but the problem is it can be installed only outside, and not in a place where you are examining a patient and discussing certain personal things related to the patient's health. But with the installation of CCTVs outside the clinic, people will at least have a feeling that they are being watched before they think of acting violent.



What role does the communication factor play between a doctor and

his patient?

The situation is such that we will have to record whatever we have explained to the patient about the risks involved during the treatment, in order to take his consent before starting the treatment, so that if anything unfortunate happens to the patient during the course of treatment the relatives will have no right to blame the doctor as we already have a proof that we have explained the patient everything. Even communication is an important factor for a doctor, as sometimes miscommunication between a doctor and a patient can result into a conflict. Now IMA and also the MCI have taken these incidents seriously. In the future, we are planning to introduce teaching of communication skills because in a regular course a doctor is never taught how to sit and talk to a patient. Now these communication skills will be taught to the students in the regular course. Now we have started a student wing of the IMA in which the students will be sent to a camp where they will work among the people and learn to communicate with the people.

Doctor is considered next to God, but when he fails, it is he who faces the wrath of the people. Your comments?

One of the reasons could be films because of which people have created their own image of who a doctor is and what he can do. In films they have created the image of a doctor as a magician who gives an injection and the patient gets well, or in a movie scene where a doctor comes out of operation theatre claiming the operation is successful and the patient is out of danger, whereas in real life we do not get sleep until the patient is fully fit and ready to go home. People have to understand that doctors are not magicians and we too are human beings.

Do you feel Panchayats have enough powers in hand?



VISHWAJIT TO HAVE A CAKE-WALK IN VALPOI BUT PARRIKAR....

Matters are not favourable for BJP in the State and it is clearly indicated in the body language of party leaders. Their delay to announce the for Parrikar is one of the indicators that the party think well before saying anything.

Neither can Parrikar bank on its ally Goa Forward party in this constituency as they have no presence here. There are traditional MGP voters here as the neighbouring Sanvordem constituency is currently represented by Dipak Pauskar. But still, Parrikar can't bank on MGP voters to vote for the Lotus this time.

It is a very tactful decision that Parrikar will have to take while deciding where to throw his hat through the by-polls. The BJP can't have a pre poll survey either, as the trends in the State have gone haywire right now, with the unlikely combination of political forces.

Curchorem is a mining belt and Parrikar might not be their favourite considering the fact that it was during his tenure that the iron ore extraction and export activity was banned. Mining can be a pro or anti factor for Parrikar. People will also remember that Parrikar was the one who offered them monthly financial packages during the mining ban. The voters here would certainly be confused if they go to think about Parrikar on the mining ban yardstick.

BJP has kept its cards close to its heart. The Party's Goa unit chief Vinay Tendulkar has recently mentioned that six MLAs are ready to sacrifice their seat for Parrikar. The figure is bloated, it won't be six, as many legislators will find it politically suicidal to resign as MLA at this point of time.

Matters are not favourable for BJP in the State and it is clearly indicated in the body language of party leaders. Their delay to announce the constituency for Parrikar is one of the indicators that the party intends to think well before saying anything.

It is certain that Parrikar will pull through the by-poll as the alliance partners and his own party will make all possible efforts to ensure that he remains in the assembly. But one thing is certain that for Parrikar the by-poll won't be an easy affair. The kind of support that he enjoyed in the year 2012 is a thing of past.



Two by-polls are staring at Goa in the months ahead. One in Valpoi constituency, that appears to be already decided, while another one could be in Curchorem or Panaji. Chief Minister Manohar Parrikar has to be elected as a member of the Legislative Assembly within six months, and the clock is already ticking.

While Goa is no novice to bypolls, this time the political situation will be different. It will certainly be a cake walk for Vishwajit Rane in his traditional Valpoi constituency when he faces the by polls. The recent decision by Pratapsing Rane not to campaign against his son in this constituency has flattened Congress' prospects there.

There is no doubt that Vishwajit will breeze through the election. Though the contest will not be unopposed, it can certainly be less opposed. There is no candidate who can actually cut into the votes of Vishwajit.

Junior Rane seems to be brimming with confidence over his victory in the Valpoi constituency. The meetings that he has been addressing in various corners are well attended. There is no open rebel against him except for a few but they too are without much support.

This is the situation in Valpoi in a nut shell. But what about the constituency where Manohar Parrikar would be contesting his by-poll?

It is ironical that the man who drove his party to a historic victory in the year 2012 by decisively defeating the Congress is now searching for a safer constituency to get elected. His wave was such in the year 2012 that many of the BJP MLAs got elected merely because people wanted Parrikar to be the chief minister.

And now we are in 2017, Parrikar is already the Chief Minister, but the BJP is yet to finalise the constituency for him. Ideally it was expected that the Panaji constituency which he has been traditionally representing would be vacated for him. But the BJP MLA Siddharth Kuncolienkar is learnt to be reluctant, though he does not admit it in public.

The decision by Atanasio Monserrate to contest against Parrikar in the Panaji

constituency by-poll has also made the BJP think twice. It would be a conflicting situation for the Goa Forward party and its leader Vijai Sardesai, if Monserrate contests against Parrikar, as the former is his friend and the latter is his chief minister.

Parrikar himself is finding Panaji as not too safe a constituency for him. The situation has changed since 2012 in Panaji. So the next option is Curchorem.

Loyal BJP leader Nilesh Cabral was amongst the first MLAs ready for sacrifice. He had also expressed his willingness to step down during the first few meetings of BJP. But here too, Parrikar will have to take decision wisely. Curchorem has never been his constituency. There are sizeable voters who might not vote for Parrikar there.

Another factor here is the way BJP has treated its former leader Ramrao Desai, whose political ambitions have been crushed. Similarly, the Goa Suraksha Manch is active here in the form of Sham Satardekar, former MLA. Congress too has its hold here. And many of the voters here vote for Nilesh Cabral as an individual. SMUGGLED CIGARETTES IN COASTAL BELT, LOSSES TO THE TUNE OF CRORES

A massive racket of sale of illegally imported and non tax paid contraband cigarettes has spread its roots across Goa, now threatening the coast and the towns.

Margao town is severely affected, as many college students have shifted to cheaper contraband cigarettes over the legal branded ones, increasing the vulnerability to the problem even more. The contraband cigarettes not only affect the users but also the Government revenue, as the State suffers tax loss because of these illegal imported cigarettes. People in this trade say that the increase in tax has had an inverse effect on the sale of cigarettes, wherein the cheaper option which is even more deadly is being preferred.

Over ten years back the display of cigarette brands and posters was discontinued in Goa to counter the ill effects of tobacco use. After this ban on advertising there have been constant efforts to keep the public use of cigarettes at bay. GoaCAN is one of the NGOs that have been assisting several of these programs and raids.

The influx of imported contraband cigarette brands in the market do not fulfil government norms, and are causing huge losses to the legal businesses as well as health damage to the users of these products. According to a market study, the youngsters - mostly college students - are falling prey to these cheap Chinese and Dubai imported cigarettes. TNV took a round of the cigarette sellers in Margao town where the cigarettes of these five to six contraband brands were seen being sold openly. These cigarettes are being sold at Rs.70 compared to Rs.246 for the legal cigarettes brand which has 80% of warning display.

"The cigarette packets do not have any

maximum retail price (MRP) or the packaged date (PKD. Dt) and do not have any signs of warnings. While the government mandate is to cover 80 percent of the packet with warnings these contraband cigarettes are being sold in total violation of this mandate," said the GoaCAN Convenor Roland Martins.

The Government is totally in the dark over this racket. The State Government has not been able to differentiate and ascertain the loss of the revenue due to the increase in taxation and meanwhile is losing out big time on the sale of contraband cigarettes. The marketing of these smuggled contraband cigarettes has killed the legal cigarettes market of South Goa and has resulted in 70 percent decline of the legal sale. "The entire VAT (value added tax) on the sale of these smuggled cigarettes is lost by the Government," said distributor of ITC, Vishant Pankar. The market of these contrabands has reached over 30 to 40 percent of South Goa. "The display and sale market has been captured by these brands," said Pankar. The Goa Government is getting 25 percent of VAT from the sale of the legal cigarettes. There needs to be awareness and education of the retailers who are the first buyers of these cigarettes," said Pankar.

In Margao the Gandhi Market has become the centre of the wholesale distribution and sale of these contraband cigarettes. They are being sold with stickers that say 'Duty paid', and no one seems to know where they come from. The situation is worse in North Goa. There are appointed men in Goa who go around the State selling these smuggled imported cigarettes. According to some of the cigarette sellers and distributors of Indian Trading Corporation (ITC) the imported cigarette sellers have developed a better network then them. The section 5 and 7 of COTPA Act empowers the Police and the Mamlatdar to take action against the sellers of these imported illegal cigarettes and they can be fined up to 10,000 rupees. But the police and the authorities are seen imposing fines of 200 rupees for non display of boards at shops and not cracking down on the bigger violation of these contraband cigarettes sale.

It may be recalled that the Commissioner of Customs, Goa, on February 25 midnight, foiled an attempt to smuggle 350 cartons of foreign cigarettes in a container at Mormugao Port Trust (MPT) valued at 2.36 crore.

The officials during the course of the first check examination of the container, from Dubai, detected 350 cartons of Dunhill and Djarum Black brand cigarettes the same which are now sold openly in all the towns of Goa. In yet another haul at Kochi, the Directorate of Revenue had seized cigarettes of worth over 2 crores. The cigarettes, 6560 cartons in number, of the brand Gudang Garam were seized here. These are some of the many brands which have captured the Indian market and have become a headache for legal businesses.

According to available information other airports and ports of India are also hosts of these consignments and these cigarettes come to Goa through Hubli, Bangalore and other ports and airports. The Dabolim Airport is stringent and any such illegal influx is promptly stopped.

As there is no information or track of the entire network of these contraband sales, the Government and the law enforcement agencies have an uphill task on cracking down of these illegalities. Going by the details which are now surfacing, the entire business and discipline has gone for a toss and the businessmen in the trade are expecting it to get worse in the days ahead.

BREAK THE SPEED

The year 2017 does not seem to have started on a very good note for Goans. The first four months of the year have yielded a deadly toll, with every single day reporting traffic collisions and subsequent deaths. Rash and negligent driving has been a major cause in all the accidents.

The 17 April accident on the Corlim-Old Goa highway that killed five including a four-year-old and injured four others is one of the deadliest accidents the State has seen in recent times and is also a case of rash driving – where the driver lost control over the vehicle and rammed into pedestrians, killing them too.

"I know there is need for stricter implementation of the road safety norms. Enforcement agencies need to be more vigilant and act seriously against all traffic offenders. But at the same time, we also need to be careful while driving. Rash and negligent driving is a reason for majority of the accidents; not only in Goa but across the country," Chief Minister Manohar Parrikar said.

As per the statistics, till mid April, this year, as many as 105 people lost their lives with a total of 1227 accidents being reported across the State. The first 15 days of April reported 11 deaths, almost one death per day.

The official figures of Goa Traffic Police reveal a 10 percent rise in the number of road accidental deaths in the first 110 days of the year. However, this figure is slightly on the lower side compared to 2016, which saw a 15 percent increase in deaths in the first three months compared to 2015.

Interestingly, despite there being a drop in the number of accidents, the number of fatal and grievous accidents and the total number of deaths are on the rise. This is revealed in comparative statistics up to mid-April of 2016 and this year.

This year, till April 17, 105 people have lost their lives, compared to 96 people who succumbed to injuries in 2016. The total number of fatal accidents reported this year so far are 95, whereas last year during the same period it was 92.The grievous accidents were 52, whereas now it is 64.

The figures of the last three years, reveal that on an average 24-28 lives are lost every month in the State, with an average of 350 accidents taking place. For the year, 2016 altogether 325 people lost their lives, whereas in 2015 the number was 316 and in 2014 it was 304.

A detailed study of the accidents has revealed that 92.23 percent of the accidents were due to rash and negligent driving. Of the total accidents reported, 42.30 percent of accidents involved motorcyclists. They also top the chart with maximum number of accidental deaths, which is almost 80 percent.

"Rash and negligent driving is a major cause of road accidents and deaths. A majority of fatal accidents involve youths between the age group of 18-35 years," a senior transport department official said.

Also, non-wearing of helmet leads to death most of the time, the official said, stressing on the need to make helmet compulsory even for pillion riders.

An interesting statistic that the traffic cell data reveals is that the majority of accidents take place between 5pm to 6pm. And it seems to be true, as the Corlim-Old Goa deadly accident was reported during this time. Being a peakhour, the possibility of accidents during this time is high.

Also, one fourth of the accidents occur during night time, which is basically due to drunk driving and negligent driving, presuming that the road is open and there isn't much vehicular movement. Of the total 1222 accidents reported, 242 accidents occurred at night time. The recent accident involving two youths, one from the media organization, was reported late at night. Both the youths died on the spot, with one of them alleged to have consumed alcohol.

Further, Sunday seems to be an accident prone day, with nearly 17.65 percent of accidents being reported on that day, followed by Tuesday, which witnessed 16.10 percent of accidents.

The State Traffic Cell has identified 55 accident prone zones – 33 in North and 22 in South Goa. It is now in the process of identifying more such zones. Data reveals that 33.33 percent of accidents have occurred on national highways. Straight roads accounted for 75.42 percent of accidents while curved roads witnessed 19.91 percent.

The Verna junction on the Panjim-Margao highway is one of the major accident prone zones. Two people died on the spot on April 20 at this junction. The villagers subsequently blocked the highway in protest.

Area-wise statistics show that maximum accidents have been registered in Margao, followed by Ponda, Mapusa, Porvroim and Verna. Margao is also on top in the number of fatalities, followed by Pernem, Maina Curtorim, Bicholim and Ponda. Again Margao also tops in two wheeler accidents followed by Mapusa, Ponda, Porvorim and Cuncolim.

There is a steep rise in the number of accidents in the areas of Colva by 50 percent, followed by Anjuna-44.44 percent, Saligao-83.33 percent, Quepem-36 percent, and Calangute-18 percent.

Most truck accidents were seen in Ponda, followed by Mapusa, Maina Curtorim, Pernem and Collem, while Verna tops in car accidents followed by Porvorim, Agasaim, Panjim and Margao. Interestingly, this year so far there have been no casualties due to trucks involved in transportation of iron ore.

DySP traffic North Goa, Dharmesh Angle says the density of traffic on the roads has reached saturation point. A number of educational programmes by the department have been held to bring down the accident rate. "People also need to be careful while driving. They need to follow all the rules. It is also the responsibility of the driver or rider to ensure his or her own safety," he explains.

Following a spate of accidents, the Traffic Cell has commenced an extensive drive against traffic rule violations. Angle said that all the staff including staff from the offices have been posted on roads. Traffic Cell has strength of 600 staff members, of which over 450 are deployed only on roads to book violators of traffic rules, he said.

Heritage being ignored

A ll the heritage structures of Margao have been standing in the historic town holding a profound history of the changes Margao has seen till date. From Camara, to the class A civic body, the Camara and the Communidade building has seen the town rise and these structures hold stories within which not many know about.

The Margao Municipal Council has been time and again requested to protect and get the old dilapidated Camara in Old Market Margao to life so that it is conserved for future generations. The President of the Shadow Council Margao Savio Coutinho with historian Prajal Sakhardande inspected the building of the Old Camara in Old Market, Margao and have expressed displeasure over the way the antique structure has been ignored for years. The MMC had in an earlier list of endangered buildings listed the Camara and may have gone for demolition. The historians and Madgaonkars have registered their protest against demolishing the building and have demanded steps to get it back to its original glory.

The Engineering Section of the MMC had surveyed and identified 17 buildings or structures in Margao which are in a bad state and need quick action. The Collector and Chairperson, South Goa District Disaster Management Authority had through a letter been informed that the council had conducted a survey to identify the dangerous and unsafe buildings by visual inspections. Among these buildings were the T. B. Cunha School Building, Popular Primary School building, Old Camara Municipal building at Old Market, Cruz Mansion Near Communidade building Margao, Sukdo building Opposite Cine Lata, Golden Photo Studio building, Sanskar Co-operative Housing building, Galaxy Apartment near Cine Vishant, Gracias Furtado Building at Khareband, Predio Cardozo Building at Khareband, Villa Coutinho Building at Khareband, Residential house of Mrs. Eugenia Colaco and others opposite Holy Spirit Church, House of Pedro Avelino Luis behind New Era School, Malbhat, Margao, New Era school building at Malbhat, Lotlikar building near railway gate, Parishram Raikar and Ladu Raikar building near Chinchal railway gate and Tilve building on Erasmo Carvalho Street, Margao.

The Camara making it to the list of these 17 buildings has captured attention of the history lovers and a team of five including Savio Coutinho and Prajal Sakhardande had met the Chief Officer against the backdrop of the report and study of the MMC.

Presently the Camara, the very old and half fallen structure in Old Market in Margao is a building which came to be in the early 17th century, and has borne witness to the ups and downs and the progress of Margao town. The entire administrative system of South Goa was controlled through this building and it is considered as a time capsule of several good and bad incidents.

"We were worried and concerned that the Camra is being slated for demolition and we object and protest this as the building is as old as 1778 and also has its own historic incidents. One of the incident was on 21st September 1890 where 23 Goans who protested against the rigging of elections in favour of a Portuguese candidate were shot dead. This memory is still alive amongst the older generations and we feel it needs to be preserved for posterity so that the future has stories of the past to tell the world," told Prajal Sakhardande.





"The Camara was functional till 1905 and later was shifted to where it is now. The building has a lot of history and has to be conserved," demanded Prajal. "It can be conserved with all the technology of the 21st Century and it is a beautiful building with beautiful architectural style. It is a beautiful façade and it has to be conserved," said Prajal.

"The land acquisition is taking time and to make it fast we have met the DMA Elvis Gomes and requested him to make the process faster," he added.

Savio Coutinho while speaking about the Camara said "In 2010 when I was a chairperson Prajal wrote to me highlighting the history of the Camara and I was impressed with the study and called over Prajal to have a word. We decided to conserve this building and in the same year took a resolution to conserve the building by restoring it," Savio told.

"After we wrote for the conservation the process has been very slow and we have been continuously following up the case. There is a need for the MMC and Government to take care of the structure and start conservation of the structure as every rain is wreaking havoc on the buiding," said Savio.

The Council in a meeting had decided to take up the revival and restoration of the Old Camara. But the ambitious plan never took off due to various reasons.

Lots of literature has been already published in the news dailies of Goa highlighting the plight of the old structures like the Camara and also the New Era School building which has now been listed as a dangerous building in the town. The New Era School has been in very bad condition amongst all the schools in Margao. The school operates in the dated A.J Almeida building for more than 70 years. Four class rooms and more than 300 students sit for tuition in rooms with the roof of the school continuously dripping and large chunks of cement of the roof falling during school hours regularly. The condition of the school in the past four years has gone from bad to worse. The school has been asking for land and building for over five years now and after the MMC has now declared it dangerous it will be interesting to see where the school is shifted.

The school has made an application for land in the Housing Board but the land is blocked due to litigation. They then applied for yet another property in Aquem but the work has stopped due to lack of funds. The school management has been paying 3400 rupees rent for the premises which has now been declared as a dangerous structure.

The Communidade building near Lohia Maidan is in dire straits now. There is no record of repair work being carried out in recent times. A leaking roof, broken rafters, furniture dumped all over the main areas and bad condition of working furniture has given it a bad name. This building has been declared unsafe and for a good reason.

Problems of occupants unwilling to vacate the building for repairs, and a documentation tangle has left the building in a bad state. The Margao Municipal Council building was renovated by the council but the Communidade building which is just opposite the council and is equally old and important missed the bus.

Living Dairy-Free

n a country that loves dairy products, is veganism even possible here? The special importance of milk in India goes back to Hindu mythology. It includes the legend of the Samudra manthan. India is the world's largest producer of milk and also the largest buyer. And there is a good reason for this. In India milk is not just the morning glass you drink before you leave the house. Its uses go far beyond the dietary and nutritional purposes.

Animal milk has long been claimed as the go-to source of calcium by the dairy industry, but as it turns out, milk is bad for you. Calcium from animal milk is not absorbed as well as that from plant-based sources, and it can be accompanied by a number of dangerous health problems.

HERE ARE A FEW REASONS WHY:

In a Swedish medical study, women who consumed large quantities of dairy milk daily were more likely to sustain fractures than those who drank little to no milk.

Cow's milk contains a sugar called lactose that can be difficult for people to digest, resulting in symptoms such as nausea, cramps, gas, bloating, and diarrhea. It can also develop later in life and result in months of worsening symptoms. The consumption of all types of cow's milk was linked to an increased prevalence and severity of acne in both boys and girls.

A single serving of milk can contain as much as 24 mg of cholesterol, whereas vegan food has no cholesterol.

Many cows are pumped full of antibiotics. This practice is leading to antibiotic-resistant bacteria, which may decrease the effectiveness of antibiotics used on humans.

A single serving of whole milk can contain more than 20 percent of the recommended daily allowance (RDA) of saturated fat, but even 1 percent milk has 8 percent of the RDA. If you consume three servings of whole milk, you're already at 60 percent for the day, even before eating any food.

I know what you are all thinking. Is this vegan thing even healthy? Forget India for a minute. Can a person subsist without dairy products, or any animal products, anywhere? I assure you, you can.

The vegan lifestyle has long been criticized. There are a lot of benefits to going dairy-free, but there are some downsides too. You've probably been taught, since you were young, that you had to have milk with dinner and get your dairy in for the day according to the food pyramid. Dairy nourishes our bodies with protein, vitamin D, calcium, and potassium. Those nutrients are super important!

But if you decide to stop having dairy, keep in mind that you'll need to make up for the loss of dairy's nutrients in other ways. Taking a calcium supplement is an option. Whatever you do, you should always speak to your doctor first, before taking any vitamins or supplements or drastically changing your diet.

I can tell you that you feel less bloated and puffy. Living dairyfree is one of the most difficult commitments to make. You don't have to be perfect at it by any means, you learn through elimination, not moderation. Physically, you feel a hundred times better too. Your energy levels are up, and you no longer feel sluggish.

The cycling community has been growing at a very rapid pace in the last two years and we do notice more and more cyclists riding on Goan roads. But lately Off-road Cycling is getting very popular as many events are been organized all across Goa to promote this exciting sport. I AM GOING TO CONTINUE MY JOURNEY IN POLITICS: DR. KETAN BHATIKAR

He is one of the best physiotherapists in Goa today. A 32 year-old medical practitioner who also tried his hand at the recent assembly elections through the Panaji constituency, and someone who has received accolades at the national and international level for his work in the field of physiotherapy. Dr. Ketan Bhatikar shares some insights about his journey with Tanvi Bambolkar.

Q Was becoming a physiotherapist your childhood dream?

Not a childhood dream as such but after the 10th standard I had decided that I would take up this career. But somehow after 12th I was inclined towards Law. I even took admissions for Law after passing my HSSC, but my father insisted that I take up physiotherapy and that's how I ended up here.

Q How did your journey towards this field begin?

My dad was in charge of inspection of various companies across the country. On one such trip he happened to know about two significant institutions offering the course of Physiotherapy. I took admission in SDM College, Dharwad and that's how my journey began. Initially I did not like the field, especially because I was away from

home. I missed my mother's food. I was so much fed up with the hostel food that it badly affected my health. I suffered from gastro diseases and was also down with Chicken Guinea during this period. But after one and half year as I started knowing the subject I started liking it. Which is the best moment in your professional life up to now? There have been many, but the best one I would say is the Bangladesh Government inviting me to train their students. This feels good.

Q Did you experience any setbacks during this journey?

Yes a lot of them, I would say. Initially when I started my career many people did not really care about what I was doing. Nobody really took this profession seriously. But then I was fortunate enough to receive the help and guidance of Dayanand Narvekar who guided me. I realized that to change the system you need to get into the system and that's why I began the work in the mainstream. I began taking media briefings, started writing articles on newspapers, organized camps and participated actively in medical politics. I wanted people to know the reality of this profession

which was so much ignored and underestimated. And fortunately things changed with time. It's really heartening to see state governments Maharashtra like and Gujarat offering registered degree certificates for physiotherapy courses. Although our field has not received much support from the fields like pharmaceuticals we have still managed to attract people towards the profession.

Q Do you think there are many misunderstandings related to your profession?

There were. But at least in Goa I can see that things are changing for good. Currently around seven ministers come to me for treatment. Almost everyone in the assembly has realized the significance of physiotherapy. Even common people come to us without references. They have realized that this treatment removes the pain slowly and gradually without any side effects and I think that's the best part of our profession.

Other than your profession which other passions do you pursue? Politics has been my passion always and I think it will remain so!

So that's the reason why you entered **Q** So that s the reason why yes end into mainstream politics this year? Yes, of course. And I think it doesn't stop but I am going to continue my journey in politics till I achieve certain goals. Politics need not be only being MLA or Minister but being at some level where I can make things work. Health and sports would always remain my priorities when it comes to a political career. I wish we could provide physic therapies to people who are taking assistance under Deen Dayal scheme. Also, there is a need for mobile physio units to be set up in the state. This treatment should reach to the remotest areas of Goa. Sectors like fisheries and other departments of Goa Government too need to have physio sections for their employees.

Q So this means you are going to contest elections in the near future? Yes, and I shall decide about the constituency very soon. For me party is not important but being on the field to serve people is important.

So who is your role model and who are your advisors in this field? Ketan: My parents always guide me. But politically Sudin Dhavlikar and Vijay Sardesai have been true inspirations and guides.

Q Finally, what would you tell to the youngsters who want to take up lesser known professions like yours? I would say get a profession that's not in the limelight and get the profession in limelight with your hard work. **Eutral View** iday, April 28, 2017

Understanding and appreciating Goenkaar viewers

Difield of entertainment. Why so? Because in movies and serials, everything is preplanned. A scene is shot and retakes are done again and again till the desired impact is achieved. But drama is different. The viewers are sitting right there as the artists present their skills live. There is no scope for re-shooting or retake. Any mistake on the part of the artistes cannot remain concealed from the audience.

The relationship between the viewers and the drama is a special one. The more skillful the actors, the stronger the effect of the drama being enacted on stage. Equally crucial is a gracious and understanding audience for any drama. If not so, the drama will not achieve its desired effect. It is just because of such an understanding and mature audience that theatre is still alive.

The play being staged was 'Shante Che Kart Chaalu Aahe' at Kala Academy, Goa on 9th March 2017 at noon. The theatre was almost houseful. This itself was a sign of love for art and drama. The drama started on time after the third bell. Right from the beginning, the viewers were enjoying the drama and the laughter it was creating.

The drama was at its peak when suddenly a strange thing happened. The scene on stage had three characters – Kakasaheb (Sunil Tawade), Vyankatesh (Bhau Kadam) and Shyam (Priyadarshan Jadhav). In this scene, Kakasaheb, while reading a newspaper, sits on a wooden cot placed on the right side of the stage. As scheduled in the scene, Kakasaheb went and sat on the cot, but as he sat, the cot just broke. Fortunately by God's grace, Kakasaheb (Sunil Tawade) was unhurt, but the audience noticed that something had gone wrong and the laughter was replaced by an uneasy silence in the auditorium.

Everybody had a question – what will happen now? An artiste's skill and patience are always at stake in such situations. Such incidents are sort of provocative and challenging for an artist, but a skilled artist navigates smoothly even through such tricky situations. Here too, just the same thing occurred. The moment Sunil Tawade and his co-artistes realised what had gone wrong, they became more alert and adjusted marvelously among themselves. They deserve a special applause for this. Sunil Tawade ensured that the ongoing vein of the drama was not spoiled and promptly uttered a few impromptu 'additions' in such a style that the backstage workers also realised that something had gone wrong.

They were so alert that they entered the stage, and for a moment I thought that now they would drop the curtain or there would be a sort of sudden halt, and the rhythm or the mood of the drama would be spoiled or something like that. But thankfully nothing of that sort happened. The setting boys, without dropping the curtain, tried their best to repair the cot, but when they realised that it would not be possible to repair it, they simply lifted it and took it backstage.

Since the important prop on the stage was removed the question followed – 'now what'? How would they continue the show? Moreover, I was equally watchful about the impact of this negative incident on the viewers, but to my pleasant surprise, the next moment, I got answers to all my questions. Near the broken cot, there was a 'moda' (sort of a settee). The Kakasaheb character just pushed that moda in the place of the cot, started reading the newspaper by sitting on it and maintained the continuity of the scene. In a split minute, he continued the scene in the same mood and with the same vigour, as if nothing had happened in between.

The audience, even though stunned for a moment, started viewing with the same enthusiasm. I was really impressed by the viewers' understanding, but the story doesn't end here.

After the interval, the cot was repaired and replaced in the same position as it was before. As it was removed from the stage with great presence of mind and by maintaining the continuity of the scene, in the same way it was brought back to the stage while the drama was going on. In a scene – as Sunil Tawade entered the stage – the backstage crew brought the cot back and placed it where it was before. At that time, Shyam says to Kakasaheb "Oh! Have you brought it back?" And Kakasaheb replied "Why should I leave it? It's with me since my childhood, I won't leave it like that, so I got it repaired."


Everybody in the audience knew that this dialogue was not from the original script, yet the artists handled the whole episode so skillfully that viewers enjoyed it as a part of the drama.

The presence of mind of all the artistes was no doubt important in this peculiar episode, but more important was the patience shown by the viewers. Perhaps, this episode could have broken the link and the viewers might have taken more time to get involved in the drama again, but fortunately nothing like that happened.

Who are the designers to watch out for? GOA SHOULD BECOME A HUB FOR FILM FOR FILM RELATED SERVICES RAJEEV SHINDE



There have been some good movies produced. There is tremendous improvement on the technical aspects of the film making. A film like 'Nachomia Kumpasar' has proved that a good subject, good performances and the technical finesse can bring audiences to the theatre. If film makers maintain the quality of films and the Goan audience lends its support, Konkani movies have a good future.

O you see Goa developing as a film industry? What more can be done? What has Goa derived from IFFI?

IFFI did bring a kind of awareness people amongst and generated interest in film culture. It was the beginning of IFFI which was responsible to bring a thought in our minds that Goa can be a shooting destination and can develop itself into a provider for film related services. Goa has natural beauty and locations required for film shoots but along with that, services like studios, colour labs, VFX Studios, sound labs, with world

class facilities can be created in Goa. I remember a meeting held during the first IFFI. Everyone in that meeting had liked the idea of making Goa a hub for film related services. A film producer from any part of the world should be able to come to Goa with his project, and get his film ready from script to screen. This would bring lots of jobs for Goan artists and technicians. It will also boost tourism, hotel Industry and many other allied services.

Q What are your views on the State government's scheme for film financing?

The film makers need financial support. Goa being a small state, the audience base is smaller and it becomes very difficult to recover the cost of the film just by theatre releases. The film finance scheme is really good for the Goan film makers. It will help a film maker to sustain his interest and keep on making films. What is really needed and expected is the consistency in the scheme.

In 1997, his Konkani film 'Dekhni Durai' won the Best Film and Best Director Award at the Goa State Film Festival. In 2016, Rajeev Shinde was back with 'K Sera Sera' which was selected amongst 230 films from all over India at Indian Panorama, 47th International Film Festival of India and which went on to win the National award this year. TNV brings to you his journey.

QYou are from the theatre background. How did you get into films?

I am basically a theatre person and passionate about theatre. But films were an extension of my studies from Art College. Art Direction, Visual Communication, Communication Design, all these subjects had a very strong connect with films. This made me study film making in depth. I have tried to learn almost about every department of film making. Besides, film is also an extension of theatre. My script writing has immensely helped me in writing stories and screenplays for films. After my graduation I have worked as an art director for the Hindi film industry for some time to learn about film process and to get hands on experience of this art. I have also designed sets for TV serials. Films did not happen today. I did 'Dekkhni Durai' written

by Shri. Pundalik Naik way back in nineties. This film won Goa state awards for Best film, Best Director, Best Actor and Actress, and Best Female Singer. Many will not know but in Goa College of Art, where I teach, we do more than 30 films a year, short films, social films, animations. From concepts, story boards to the final film. So one can say films happen almost 'every day' for me. Tell us about K Sera Sera, your movie. How did the idea develop?

I am a story teller. I keep on writing stories on the subjects which inspire me or at times disturb me as a human being. Some subjects make me think; make me emotional, I put them on paper as a story, which can be later converted into a play or a film. K Sera Sera was a part of this process. It all happened on a crowded railway station, where thousands of people are around you, living in their own world, happy, sad, depressed. As a visual communication designer, playwright and a director, I always had a fascination to observe and decipher the things happening around.

The very thought of every individual, known and/or unknown going through varied circumstances, perceptions and emotions, makes me wonder about the numerous stories taking shape around us at every point of time. 'K Sera Sera' is just one of those stories which look at parallel and transverse situations from the lives of two individuals.

QAny other projects you have been working on now?

At the moment I am working on three projects. A play which I had promised my friend Harshad Tondwalkar, 'Kala Vaibhav'. Then there is a Gujarati film, based on my play "Thodassa Logic Thodassa Magic". Renowned actor Tikku Talsania who also acted in the Gujarati version of my play will be in the lead role. The third project is a film which is very close to my heart as it will be an experiment and a challenge to shoot.

Q Do you think Konkani movies have a good future?

The last few years have been very productive for Konkani movies.

INTERNATIONAL FASHION WEEK GOA

Mr William Xavier is a film maker and is into making commercials and documentaries for the last ten years. Film and fashion go hand in hand, which has drawn him into the fashion world where he is now organising 'The International Fashion Week Goa 2017'. He has also been organising the Global Indian Film Festival, a global platform for Indian films with strong content. This is the second edition of the International Fashion Week Goa, and it will be held

for three days at Taj Vivanta, Panjim. Last year the event was held from December 9 to 11 for which there was an overwhelming response. And there will be another edition in December 2017 as well. What is the theme for this edition?

The show will be held twice a year, one during the summer and another during the winter. The theme for this edition is the summer and monsoon collection and the show which will be held in December this year will feature winter as well as bridal collection

How would you describe this event and what is the objective? The objective of organising this fashion week is that it is not for fun and entertainment but for some serious business. This event will be purely business of fashion, where we will provide a stage for many talented fashion designers.

What makes this event so special?

The speciality about this event is that it is economically viable for every stakeholder and will benefit the designers, retailers, models and even the organisers. Even our audience will get to witness different types of trends, designs and collection.



Why is this show held only for three days?

This is actually a 4-day programme as we are having a curtain raiser event at Mall de Goa in Porvorim on May 7 that is on Sunday, which will be performed by two or three designers, then the main event will be held from May 12 to 14, that is Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

How many fashion designers will be participating in this event?

We will be having 24 fashion designers who will be coming to participate in this event. From Goa there will be around three to four designers along with designers from Mumbai, Bangalore, Kochi, Kolkata and Delhi. There are a few designers from Nagpur and there are around three designers who will be coming from Hyderabad also. There are international fashion designers from Mexico, Dubai, Bangladesh and Myanmar as well.

What are the events that will be conducted during this 3-day fashion extravaganza?

During these three days, we are having a Masterclass of fashion designers, there will be a workshop on fashion, we will be organising seminars and there will be a talk show on how to establish a successful business in fashion industry.

QWhat are your thoughts about Goan fashion designers?

Goan fashion designers are very talented but the only thing is that they are not coming very openly to market or promote their product. Designers from other parts of the country are willing to go to any extent to promote their brand. So I feel the Goan fashion designers should come openly and explore, as there are loads of opportunities in the market, they can promote their brand on a grand scale within Goa itself.

What are the benefits stakeholders will have from the business point of view?

This Fashion Week is more than just a show because we will be organising business to business meeting so that the designers can meet the retailers, they can interact with the prospective clients and the manufacturers. So we are trying to start a trend which is beneficial to all the stakeholders in this business. We have specially invited all the boutique owners. We have invited around 200 boutique owners who are really looking forward to the designer's clothes to sell in their retail outlets. We have invited some big showroom owners in Goa and we have also partnered with Mall de Goa. The purpose is that these boutique or showroom owners can take a look at their collections and can have a business to business meeting with the designers. We have also invited film makers in order to provide exposure to the models so that they can have an opportunity to get a role in the films and make a career. This is a show for everybody and a win-win situation for every stakeholder.
